Giamatti and Mr. Vincent about the Pik-Six of January 29th
-- January 25th, 1989?

- A No. Recall telling them what?
- Q Telling them anything about it.

A No. I think I told him the same thing I told you before, that I wish I had as many Pik-Six's as people — I think I told him that I wish I won as much money as people say I do; and I'm glad I don't lose as much as people say I do.

Q Pete, isn't it a fact that after the questioning was over, that you told Bart Giamatti and Mr. Vincent that an example of these terrible rumors was the Pik-Six that recently occurred in January out here at Turfway that we've just talked about. And that you, in fact, had not won it.

- A I don't remember saying that.
- Q Do you remember saying anything like that?
- A No.
- Q Do you remember the subject being discussed at all?

A No. I remember something about the Pik-Six. Because I remember Mr. Giamatti saying something, "We don't care about Pik-Six's" or something. Or Mr. Ueberroth or somebody. He said, "I'm just here to ask you about baseball." That's what he said.

MR. PITCAIRN: John, so your record is clear, I think that meeting was on the 20th of February, not the 22nd. Monday the 20th.

THE WITNESS: It was on a Monday because that was the second day of spring training.

MR. DOWD: Forgive me, you're right. It is the 20th.

## BY MR. DOWD:

Q Pete, in addition to the tracks River Downs and Turfway, you also bet the horses at Tampa Downs in Florida?

A Yes.

And I'm talking now, unless I indicate otherwise to you, about the period 1984 to 1988.

A Okay.

Q Okay?

Can you tell me who runs your bets at Tampa Downs? During that period of time. Take your time.

A That's very simple. Arnie if he's not there (sic), and if he's not there Mario Nunez does. Who is a maitre d' at the clubhouse.

Q Okay. Anybody else?

A No, sir. Well, I take that back. Maybe my wife but she don't go very often.

Q How would --

When I say you can't bet money there, you

understand what I'm saying? Whenever you go to a track and there's no handle. You know what handle is?

Q No, I don't.

A Handle is money bet through the window.

Q Okay.

A The odds are made based on how much money is bet through the window. Now, if they're only handling three hundred thousand dollars for the day and you go up and bet a thousand dollars on a horse, it will go from twenty to one to one to five. So you're betting against yourself.

Now, if you go to Hollywood Park or somewhere where they're handling five or six million dollars, then it doesn't matter what you bet. You don't affect the odds.

But at Tampa Bay Downs, if you wanted to, you could make the favor in every race by betting a thousand dollars on a horse. So it's just crazy.

I'll go there and I'll bet four hundred dollars to win and maybe two hundred dollars to place.

That's a big bet for me at that track.

Q A fellow named Tommy Gioiosa ever run bets for you at the track?

A I think he did -- well, let me scratch that.

Are you talking from '84 to '88? 2 Yes, sir. ٥ 3 A No. ٥ How about Don Stenger? 5 A Never. 6 Paul Janszen? 7 No. Two of those guys have been to the 8 track when I was there. Gioiosa and Janszen. But Arnie 9 was there, too, and Arnie run the bets. 10 Stenger never ran bets? Q 11 A No. I never seen Don Stenger at the race 12 track. 13 Q Never went to the race track with you? 14 Not with me. A 15 All right. 16 And let me -- while I'm on this, let me 17 clarify something else. 18 Sure. 19 Janszen, Giolosa never went to the track 20 with me. And if you want a verification, just ask the guy 21 that parks the cars at the track. I go by myself or with 22 my wife. They may have come to the track but they came in 23 their own vehicle and left in their own vehicle. 24 Did they join you at the track?

They sit where I sit. Sometimes. But I

BY MR. DOWD:

 don't necessarily look at it as they went to the track with me. I mean that's very easy to say but they're misleading someone.

To go to the track with me, you've got to get in my car, drive to the track with me, get out of the car and go through the turnstile with me. And they didn't do that.

You never took Paul Janszen to the track with you, is that what you're saying?

A That's what I'm saying.

MR. MAKLEY: As he's defined it.

THE WITNESS: That's what I'm saying.

Absolutely not.

MR. DOWD: Okay.

THE WITNESS: Because the guy saved three or four parking spots right in the front row for the guys. The regulars as he called them.

Q But you joined them at the track?
Or they joined you at the track.

A They set in my room. They set in my room. They joined me.

Q Did you invite them?

A I told them it was all right for them to sit there, as long as they were -- you know, as long as

they weren't routy.

Q The question was, did you ever invite them to the track?

A They knew I went to the track most of the time. Now we're just talking about winter time now. We're not talking about the summer time. You understand this, too. I mean I don't go to the track in the summer time. I'm playing baseball.

I don't think I ever called them up and says, "Do you want to join me at the track?" I mean if they call me, I might say, "Yes, I'm going to the track tonight. Okay, see you over there."

And there's probably a lot of nights when they were there that I wasn't there. As a matter of fact I know there was one night they were there because they caused a ruckus over there and got everybody pissed off over there and they closed the damn place down.

Q When was that?

A When I was in spring training. That's when I had my outs with them. Because they got in a fight with the damn -- the stewards.

- Q Spring training what year?
- A I don't remember.
- Q Was it this year?
- A No, no. A couple years ago.

- Did you ever bet the whole schedule? Q
- A Hell, no.

A I have to think what the schedule is. I don't even know how many football teams there are.

No, not usually.

Q Is it fair to say you bet at least a thousand per game?

A No, I think you'd bet a thousand on games you like.

Q Okay.

A See, what happens when I --

And then Monday hinges on what you did on the weekend?

A See, what happens a lot of times in betting football, I found that you might like a team and you bet a thousand on it. But you run into a problem, that game is not on TV and you can't watch it. You just watch the scoring opportunities.

So you might bet, you know, five hundred bucks on a team that's going to be on TV. You know, every Sunday in Cincinnati the Bengals are on TV, whether they're on the road or whether they're at home.

Q Okay.

A And you may not like their game but you're just going to bet on the Bengals just to root for them.

And just to have an interest to bet, you bet five hundred.

Q Okay.

It's not going to break you doing that. 2 All right. Okay, now let's get back to 3 settling up on Tuesday. 4 Okay. 5 If you lost, I take it it's a net loss; 6 right? A I don't know. I never thought about it, being the most.
